Douglas County Humane Society Pet Pantry Assistance Policies and Procedures Agreement Revised November 1, 2018

Pet food assistance is available on a temporary basis not to exceed 3 months. If you still need assistance after 3 months you must re-apply and be approved by the Douglas County Humane Society.

Pet food assistance is limited to 2 pets. Any combination will be determined on a case by case basis. Any exceptions must be approved by the Douglas County Humane Society.

Only the person(s) authorized on this application can pick up food. If you are disabled or homebound please make arrangements and get approval prior to pick up. The person authorized to pick up must show their ID.

Douglas County Humane Society reserves the right to refuse assistance to any applicant regardless of prior approval if we determine you have not met or no longer meet our requirements.

BASIC REQUIREMENTS TO RECEIVE FOOD

- 1. You must be a Douglas County resident and provide proof of such. Proof can be a valid driver's license, government issued ID or green card.
- 2. Proof of unemployment, low income status, disability or other legitimate need is required.
- 3. Proof of rabies vaccination for all pets in household receiving assistance.
- 4. Agree that your pets are for companionship only and not for breeding or any illegal activities.
- 5. Agree to maintain healthy living conditions, provide clean drinking water, and adequate shelter for all pets at all times.
- 6. Agree not to tether or chain dog(s) 24/7. Tethering or chaining a dog is against Douglas County ordinance at any time unless directly supervised.
- 7. Agree to provide medical care for all pets when needed, including but not limited to sickness and painful hereditary or age-related conditions.
- 8. Agree not to obtain any new animals while receiving assistance.

All food provided comes solely from donations, so we may limit the quantity of food given based on what is available. All food is on a first come first serve basis, therefore cannot be guaranteed. Pet Pantry should not be the only source of food for your pets.

You are not guaranteed the same food you have been feeding, or the same amount of food each month. Switching food is known to cause upset stomach and diarrhea. It is best to mix some of the old food with the new food for a few days. If you are unable to do this or if your pet experiences an upset stomach, we recommend adding canned food to your pet's diet during the transitional period.

If your pet requires a special diet you must have a letter from your veterinarian.
